# 5. What was the weakest aspect of FOPP (distance learning and seminar)? What would you do to improve it, or with what would you replace it? (42 responses)

- I didn't like the Quiz website. It was confusing and difficult to navigate.
- (Distance). The first portion of the course felt impersonal; consider having an intro webinar to introduce John and the course. (Seminar). No complaints.
- It was hard to find anything weak about this experience. If anything, I think it would be beneficial to provide a binder summarizing all of the speakers' lecture.
- You <u>must</u> update your writing skills information to reflect words, places, and sentence ? that are more commonly used in engineering writing. For example, to simplistic.
- The beginning seemed impersonal. A video or some other form of introduction to the program would be helpful.
- Very tough to say...but, I found the quizzes to be the most frustrating, Maybe less of them.
- The information in the text book was excellent, however, I found it was a little difficult to internalize. I'd suggest more focus on the GBA e-brown bag, which presented a lot of the same information along with the text book. I also thought some of the quiz questions were misleading, although this might be by design.
- The weakest aspect of FOPP was the distance learning. To improve distance learning, I believe connecting reading topics to video lectures and commentaries to each chapter would make the distance learning more interactive and robust.
- Reading assignments should be replaced with video summaries, like the "e-brownbag" video series.
- Not enough time to network with everyone. Incorporate a 30 minute networking activity with people not in self-intro/report summary groups or in the "table" groups. Minor issues.
- Seminar lacked any real free time to experience the wonderful setting. No need to change.
- Participants didn't come together until ending of seminar. A starting seminar could also add value in building relationships.
- Participation with other class members. Have a group activity or check-in as part of distance learning.
- Lack of broad materials. (Only had text). Video learning. Could have fit more web-based materials.
- No discussion about accounts receivables and how to deal with that issue.
- The research presentations were very informative and often applicable to me, but most participants could have used mort time to present. 15 minutes.
- It is so hard to read the hand written comments. Use computers to mark and ext comments.

- The wording on a few of the quiz questions was challenging. I felt that I know the answer but was incorrect.
- Case history workshop group size could be smaller.
- It was intense, but every part was important. I would have rather had a full day (or half) on Wednesday, rather than the 1/2 day on Saturday.
- I think more interaction between the participants during the distance learning phase would be beneficial. I would recommend making interaction between participants mandatory.
- Some of the quiz questions had two good answers that required guessing the best answer.
- The weakest aspect of FOPP was not making good use of Linked-In. I would have appreciated more prompt responses to questions. I noticed that the schedule of due dates for the distance learning was clustered toward the end of the class. Although, it may have been purposeful to simulate pressure, a more evenly dispersed schedule would have helped me.
- The one thing my group struggled with was the facilities technology for our presentations. Most of our computers were to new to be able to connect to the projector. I think the weakest part of the program was the fact that the participants did not connect until the seminar. It may be nice to incorporate an introduction seminar to introduce the participants.
- Have requirements on mentors put in place.
- I didn't put adequate study into the quiz portions of the program. That is mostly due to my own negligence. Still, there may be other ways to encourage quality study of the text. I loved the text book, and now know where to look with questions.
- I regret not calling John more to discuss the text book and the Limitation of Liability handbook. Although the text books are very helpful, I should have spent more time discussing the lessons with John.
- Mr. Bachner should be open to have one visual interaction (Skype) with all participants. Either one-on-one or group. Seminar end the seminar at 8 pm so that participants can exercise and or be in touch with family.
- Distance I did the reading and quizzes, but I felt like more of an individual than a class mate. Perhaps you should encourage a small amount of interaction between class mates during distance learning. The Linked-In group was not utilized much.
- I think some interactive element during the distance education would be helpful. Maybe some lectures offered through online participation.
- I would have liked clearer mark-ups on report submissions but understand that may not be easy to implement!
- John's attitude with respect to the submissions. I do understand this was a role he played.
- Nothing. Schedule was difficult at times, but serves the intent.
- None.
- Self reading. (Could be enhanced/replaced with webinars or recorded presentations).
- I felt a lot of effort, almost 75% of the time spent was on the research project and related re-writes. I would like to see more activities, tests, readings, etc. on the risk management, proposal and human interaction of the book. I feel that we spend so much time on that in our work lives that6 we could benefit greater.
- The distance learning part was a bit disconnected. I suggest to have a short on-line seminar to get things started. Something like a 2.3 hour WebEx meeting.
- Minimal leadership content in distance learning.
- I thought the distance reading assignments and quizzes were not exciting. The content is valuable, but wished there was more communication with the class or discussion.
- The quizzes I don't believe helped confirm knowledge of the text book but I did get value from the book. Possible just watching a video summary webinar of each chapter or something interactive.
- Business development tactics, tips, and advice. Have a guest speak on the topic.
- More communication between FOPP staff and students throughout the course (i.e., updates LinkedIn discussion board, feedback, etc.)
